MORE ABOUT TENSE

NOTES

There are two Tenses of Verbs in English – Past and Present. These

Tenses have three aspects:-

Progressive or Continuous, Perfective and Perfect Progressive or Perfect Continuous.

1. Chart of English Grammar Tenses of a Verb:

Tense + Aspect = Tense form	Simple	Continuous	Perfect	Perfect Continuous

Example	I work hard.	I am working hard.	I have worked hard.	I have been working hard

- (i) 'Tense' is looked upon as a form of Verb which have close relation with 'Time'.
- (ii) Verb 'Base + s' is used in the Present when the subject is in third person singular number.
- (iii) Verb 'is' is used in the Present when the subject is in third person singular number.
- (iv) Verb 'am' is used in the Present when the subject is in first person singular number.
- (v) Verbs 'are' and 'were' are used when the subject is in first person plural, second person and third person plural number. 'are' is used in the Present and 'were' in the past.
- (vi) Verb 'has' is used in the Present when the subject is in third person singular.
- (vii) Verb 'have' is used in the Present when the subject is in first person, second person and third person plural.
- (viii) Some verbs are generally not used in the Continuous Tense. These are verbs denoting abstract nouns. Some of them are feel, know, think, believe, understand, hear, hope, like, belong etc. However, when they express a special meaning, some of them can be used in sentences.
- (ix) Verbs in Perfect Continuous Tenses do not exist in the Passive.
- English verbs do not have a separate form for 'Future Tense'. Future time is expressed by different forms.
