This sonnet has three quatrains and a couplet. It follows the rhyme scheme *abab cdcd efef and gg*. The ideas are developed in the three quatrains and the conclusion in the couplet.

**POETIC DEVICES USED**

**1. Personification:** "the eye of heaven"

"his gold complexion"

"nor shall death brag thou"

"this gives life to thee"

**2. Metaphor:** "darling buds of May"

"gold complexion"

"thy eternal summer"

"eternal lines to Time"

**3. Alliteration:** "every fair from fair"

"chance of nature's changing course"

**4. Repetition:** "more", "summer", "eternal", "this", "so long" etc.
