THE SOLDIER by Rupert Brook

ABOUT THE POEM

The poet, Rupert Brooke, was an officer in the British Army fighting in the First World War and was killed in the Eastern Mediterranean in 1915 just after four months of joining in the war at the young age of 28. He was considered to be one of the three soldier poets of the First World War.

The poem "The Soldier" is a sonnet (a kind of poem consisting of fourteen lines originated from Italy). In this poem, the poet shows the intense feeling of idealistic patriotism and the pride of being an Englishman. He even appreciated war as an end to the way Dert Production of his deep love for his motherland.

The poet, Rupert Brooke expresses deep love of motherland, intense idealistic patriotism and the pride of being an Englishman. He has a unique and the most beautiful idealistic life in which he appreciates war. According to him, being a soldier, he should be killed in the battlefield in a strange foreign land. When he dies in some corner of a foreign field and bury there, the piece of land will be forever England. In such a place, a rich English body whose body and mind were shaped in the rich English culture and tradition will lie buried as a vivid symbol of patriotism for all the time. After the poet dies in this manner, his soul and body will be purified and will also be merged with the Absolute Soul, the Creator. Thus, he would be able to preach the beautiful patriotic thoughts and feelings of England, his lovely motherland.
