Introduction: The author Cypryian Ekwensi was born in the city of Minna, Nigeria on 26th of September, 1921 and died on 4th of November, 2007. He was a Nigerian author of novels, short stories and children's fictions. 'The Coin Diver' is taken from his collection of short stories called 'Lokotown'. It is a very beautiful romantic story setting on the Atlantic shore of Freetown in Sierra Leone. In this story a poor coin diver tried very hard to win the heart of a beautiful lady who sang like a canary. After trying without success, he sailed to Canary Islands in Cape Verde and bought himself a canary. The story depicts hopes and disappointments, joy and sadness in the life of Charlie, the coin diver.

Summary: On the Atlantic shore of Freetown, one afternoon in the bright sunlight, Nancy came down the lane alone. She was tall and beautiful with rich black skin. And her lips were red with lipsticks. Charlie, the coin diver pushed aside the flower bush and gazed at her from behind. As he was attracted to the beauty of the girl he wanted to express his love for her. He was very poor. But Nancy was the singing star of Grand Palm Hotel. She was like a singing canary. Because of her, everybody who came to Freetown must go to Grand Palm to lodge. Charlie hopefully stepped forward and told Nancy that he had something to tell her. But to see Nancy's smiling face he was confused and did not know how to express his word. When he turned his face, he saw Diamond Joe, his bitter rival standing behind him. He filled is canoe with food and water and one night he sailed to Canary Islands in Cape Verde to bring a canary for himself.

For many days he was in the Atlantic, facing many difficulties. He finally ceased off in Canary Islands. But it was impossible for him to catch a canary. At the bazar, he found a canary with a voice like Nancy. But the bird cost all that he had and he got no means to return. Word Notes

Coin diver – person who dives in the sea to collect coins thrown by passengers and tourists for good luck and safety or some sort of entertainment. Many African young men used to dive into the sea to pick up coins. For tourists it is a sort of entertainment but for coin divers that is how they earn their living. Charlie of the story is also such a person
